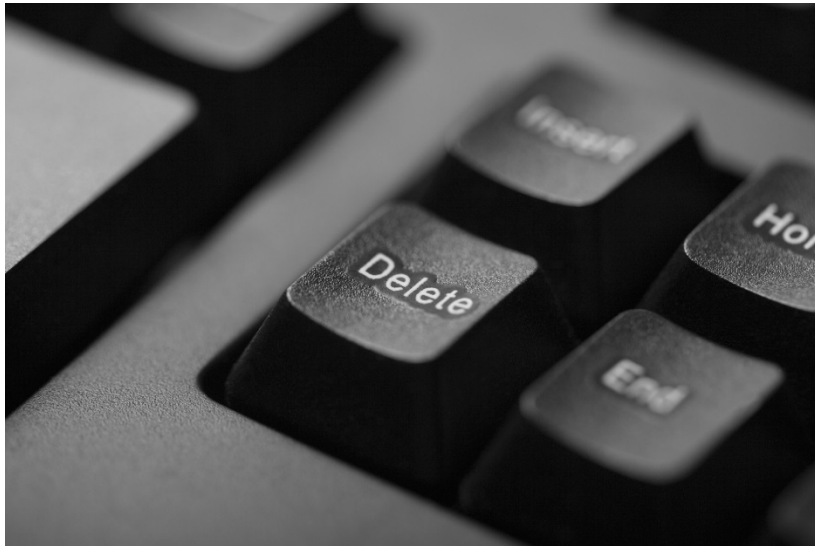


# Equifax Data Breach



First, we want to assure members that United 1<sup>st</sup> FCU share accounts were not compromised as part of the Equifax breach.

While the Equifax Cyber Attack has potentially exposed data of 143 million consumers, there are some simple steps you can take now to stay on top of and help to protect your own information:

- Go to [www.equifaxsecurity2017.com](http://www.equifaxsecurity2017.com) , a site established by Equifax, where they will inform consumers if their data may have been compromised. The site also offers complimentary identify theft protection and monitoring.
- Keep an eye on checking accounts and credit cards. At a minimum, review statements in detail each month. We also encourage you to log online and check your accounts more frequently at [www.united1stfcu.org](http://www.united1stfcu.org)
- Check your free credit report at [www.annualcreditreport.com](http://www.annualcreditreport.com)
- Call the credit bureaus to put a fraud alert on your reports

- Sign up for a credit monitoring or identity theft protection service
- Put a freeze on your credit (fees vary by state, age and credit bureau)
